6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum of the UG classes is prepared by the affiliating university (Gauhati University). However, a few faculties are the member of the committee of Course of Studies (CCS) of Gauhati University, who participated during the respective meetings and contributed to the development and modification of the syllabus and curriculum.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The faculties prepare their Teaching Plans and submit the same to the IQAC within 10 days of the commencement of a semester.
- The faculties submit their Monthly Performance Report to the IQAC in the first week of every month.
- The principal of the college with the help of IQAC compares the Teaching Plans and the Monthly Performance Report of a particular teacher, and if necessary, discusses the matter in the Academic council (comprising all HODs).
- Teachers are encouraged to use ICT as their teaching aids to make their classes more interesting and effective. For this, the college provides necessary infrastructure, namely, PC, laptop, LCD projectors, smart board, etc. to the departments.
- Many teachers prepare the study materials and distribute the same to the students.
- Feedbacks from the students on the performance of the faculty are collected and analyzed. The same is placed before the Academic Council for necessary action.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The college conducts the end semester examinations as per schedule of the affiliating university.
- The college administration takes all the necessary steps for fair examinations.
- The college has been regularly chosen as the Spot Evaluation Zone by the Gauhati University. The college teachers evaluate the scripts as required.
- The college conducts sessional examinations for continuous evaluation.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The faculties are encouraged to avail Teacher Fellowship under FIP of UGC to pursue the research activities.
- The college makes available a good number of research journals and related materials in the central library.
- The college also encourages the faculties to participate in various seminars/conferences/workshops etc. Where they can exchange their views with the peers on the frontier knowledge.
- The Research committee of the college helps the teachers who want to apply for projects to various funding agencies, viz., UGC, DST, DBT, CSIR etc. The committee provides all necessary infrastructures (including laboratory, internet, Xerox machine etc.) to the teachers who undertake research project.
- The college publishes two peer reviewed Research Journals (One for Science and another for Humanities and Social Sciences).

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- A new room has been constructed to accommodate the IQAC of the college.
- Drainage and Internal roads of the college have been improved.
- The College Canteen has been renovated.
- Some more Library books have been procured.
- A Reading Room with a seating capacity of 80 students at a time has been constructed.
- Two large classrooms and two new departments have been constructed.
- A PG laboratory for Chemistry department has been set up.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The college authority encourages the faculties to pursue research works that help them to update in the frontier area of knowledge.
- Along with a good number of research journals, various daily news papers, magazines and news bulletins are subscribed to help the staffs.
- The college has organizes three workshops/ training programmes and three National Seminars for quality improvement of the faculty and the staff.
- 20 faculty members presented research papers in National Seminars.
- 85 faculty members participated in National Seminars

- The college seeks permission from Department of Higher Education, Assam to conduct the interview for selection of staff.
- The advertisements for the recruitment of faculty and non-teaching staff are published in the local and national news papers.
- The selection of the teaching and non-teaching staff is conducted according to the rules of the Govt. of Assam.
