B N College (Estd. 1946) is using B N C Integrated Management System (BNCIMS) since 20182019 academic session. BNCIMS has two major divisions for easy handling. b) Academic and a) Establishment Academic division of the system has Pre admission module under which all preadmission processes of the college take place, namely, online issue of application and prospectus, received of online application form and publication of merit list. College automation module under the same division contains students' database. The Learning Management System (LMS) portal is one of the important initiatives of the college having individual teachers' IDs and registration of students of respective classes. The LMS module is operated for uploading of study materials (documents, video etc), assigning home work/project and organising examinations. Under this division, the management of central library is carried out through SOUL (version 2.0) where, the data entry of books and journals, entry and exit database of visitors (through member OPAC), searching of books and journals for its availability/shelf position and resource transaction of the central library are managed. Apart from this, students' enrolment in the affiliated university for concerning programmes and the examination related data namely, endsemester examination form fill up, admit card generation, uploading of sessional marks, practical marks, etc are managed via the Management Information System of affiliated University, Gauhati University. Under the Establishment division, the account and finance module is live and operating. This module manages all the financial transaction including income tax of the employees of the college. This module also manage cashbook, ledger entry, receipt and payment of bills. The Establishment division also contain the staff attendance module where the database of the attendance of all the employees are recorded. There is also a Teaching staff Profile module managing the updated profiles of the teachers of the college. The Alumni management is

carried out through the Alumni portal where the alumnus can register themselves and become connected with their alma matter. The feedback/suggestions of alumni are also collected through this module.

# **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

# 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

At the beginning of academic session, the daily class routine is prepared and the unitization of the syllabus among the faculty members is done by each departments. The faculty members prepare their Teaching Plan and Lesson Plan and maintain their Class Diary on daily basis. The faculty members also submit their Monthly Progress Report on the first week of every month. Some of the classes are delivered using ICT and softcopies of the study materials are uploaded in the LMS portal of the college which are available to the students. The faculty members organise seminar, quiz, group discussion, dramatization etc. among the students to improve their knowledge over the topic which further help to develop their confidence and communication skill. The students are also allotted the Home assignment and submit the same to the respective teachers for evaluation and suggestions. The Diagnostic test has been conducted among the students to identify the slow learners, average learners and advanced learners in a class. Further, the advanced learners are encouraged to discuss about their subjects among their peers, so that the slow and average learners can enable themselves to cope with the classes. In addition to that, the advanced learners are encouraged to study reference books, journals and other study materials to know the advancement of knowledge in the respective areas. Moreover, extra/remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners to find out their lacking areas and try to fill the knowledge gap as well as cushion classes are often organised for the advanced learners. The advanced learners are also encouraged to join course under SWAYAM platform. The faculty members of the departments having practical classes demonstrate and guide the students to do the practical classes using various tools, equipment, etc. The faculty members also guide the students in their field visits and preparation of the report related to their subjects. The students having dissertation as a part of their curriculum are assigned with a research topic under the supervision of the faculty members. The students are imparted with the basic knowledge of research methodology and the respective supervisors are entrusted to guide the students to write the dissertation. The IQAC of the college is entrusted to conduct the internal Academic Audit in each semester to monitor the progress of the completion of the syllabus by the faculty members and submit a detail report to the Principal for further action. The IQAC is also entrusted to organise the external Academic audit by external committee once in three years to monitor the academic progress of the college.

# 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

#### Feedback Obtained

Student online feedback system is introduced for academic session 2019-20. It aims at to ensure easy and transparent feedback collection process. The final semester students have been asked to submit feedback through online portal. The collected data are mainly ordinal in nature. Feedback form has been prepared considering two criteria - curriculum and teaching-learning aspect. Feedback on curriculum has following parameters - how much the curriculum caters need of the students, how far the curriculum and syllabus are well organized and learner centric, how much the curriculum is useful for your personality development, how far the curriculum added new knowledge, employability of the curriculum, how will you rate the subject offered by the College. The feedback on teaching-learning aspect has been collected on six parameters, like, how much of the syllabus was covered in the class, fairness of the internal evaluation by teacher, how far the sessional examination help the students in improving studies, teacher-student relationship in the college, etc. The students rate each parameter with unsatisfactory, satisfactory, good, very good and excellent respectively. On the basis of the collected data, a report has been prepared and submitted to the college authority. The principal has presented the report in the Governing Body meeting. The Governing Body

discusses the report in detail and takes the necessary steps. It has been observed that, while the college is performing well in some parameters, there are certain areas where there is scope of improvement. Under the parameter curriculum/ course content, the institution has no scope to modify the course content which is prepared by the affiliating university. However, the institution has a good number of members in Committee for Course and Syllabus (CCS) of the university who can recommend necessary inputs regarding the syllabus. As per as the coverage of syllabus is concern, if any of the department/ teacher is unable to finish the assigned syllabus within the stipulated time, Principal discusses with the concern teacher/department and ask them to take necessary efforts so that the syllabus can be finished ahead of examination. Principal also guides the concern faculty member to maintain and follow the teaching plan submitted in the beginning of the session so that the syllabus can be covered in due time. Regarding the overall performance of the teacher, the principal encourages and motivates the teacher to perform their responsibilities wholeheartedly. In addition to that, IQAC organises various faculty development programmes in the college to enhance the teaching quality of the faculty members and keep them up to date. Feedback from the faculty pertaining to their satisfaction in modelling of a curriculum plays a pivotal role in establishing the importance of an educational institution in the society. IQAC collects structured feedback from teachers regarding curriculum design through Google form questionnaire. There are 7 questions in the feedback form. For the session 2018-19, total 66 feedback responses have been received and the analysis of feedback of each question. The feedback analysis report is placed before GB B N College for action taking as per report.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The IQAC of the college has been continuing the process of mentoring the students in a regular basis. A group of not more than 20 students are being mentored by a faculty of a department. The mentor establishes amicable and trustworthy relationship with the mentees so that the mentees feel free and secure while discussing any issues of their concern with the mentor. The mentor collects the profile and academic information of the mentees and prepares a database. Apart from that, the mentor identifies slow, average and advanced learners among the mentees in his/her group with the help of the data of diagnostic and midterm test organized by the departments.

The mentor deals with the various issues of the mentees and tries to resolve them in his/her own capacity.

However, if necessary, the mentor consults with other faculty members of department, career counselling and placement cell, library staff etc. and take the necessary measures. In addition, the mentor guides the mentees for preparing resume and other writing skills necessary for day to day life. The mentor meets the mentee at regular intervals. Since the mentor is expected to guide and help the students for their all round development, the mentor tries to enhance their cognitive ability, develop insights, and decision making capacity. Moreover, the mentor guides the mentees to improve their communication and leadership skills. Apart from that, the mentees learn how to set their future goals including their career options. Moreover, In this cut-throat competitive world, it is very much important to live in harmony and maintain peace and tranquillity in the society. Therefore, the mentor motivates the mentees to develop the feeling of responsibleness for the society nation and this planet.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows continuous internal evaluation system. As a part of it, the college conducts sessional examination, need based class test, and allots home assignments to the students at regular basis. Moreover, the college has introduced certain reformative measures like - Diagnostic test and Mid-term tests as a part of the Continuous Internal Evaluation system in the college from the academic session 2018-2019. The Diagnostic and Mid-term tests are conducted primarily by using OMR sheets in which students are given multiple choice questions. The diagnostic test is conducted for the first semester after one month of the regular classes attended by the students to assess their level of understanding. The Mid-term test is also conducted for rest of the students to monitor progress on their subjects. Apart from that, peer-teaching, dramatisation etc. have been introduced in the college in order to make the teaching-learning process more engaging. In peer-teaching method, a particular topic is given to one or two students which they initiate in the class followed by a discussion by the rest of the students. On the other hand, in dramatisation, student performs an act of a particular character of a drama or novel followed by a discussion which aims to disseminate the socio-cultural context of the particular character among the students. Moreover, subject specific Seminar, Quiz, Debate, Assignments etc. have been conducted among the students by all the departments as a part of continuous internal evaluation.

The collaboration of the college with the Indian Skill Academy, Guwahati and Skillfinity, Guwahati which are best known for soft skill development enables the students to empower themselves with expertise on communication, creative writing and cognitive thinking, etc. The objective behind the introduction of the enrichment courses, other classroom activities, MoU and linkage programmes undertaken by the college are to help the students to develop advanced skills and inculcate human values. This will empower the students in earning their livelihood and simultaneously work for a harmonious and peaceful society.
